Meet a Teacher: Mr. Taylor

Mr. Taylor is an eighth-grade math teacher at Luther Burbank Middle School. Let us learn more about him!

Mr. Taylor has been teaching students for over ten years. He grew up in Ohio and went to the University of Michigan. He studied math and joined Math for America, a program that trains math teachers.



One of Mr. Taylor's most popular nicknames is "Tay Tay". Mr. Taylor explained the story: "The nickname 'Tay-Tay' goes back to my first year of teaching in 2015. When we were doing a field trip, I led students the wrong way to get to Meridian Gate and one student called out, 'Wrong way, Tay-Tay' which was heard by Ms. Roederer (the Assistant Principal at the time). Ms. Roederer started using that as a nickname for me, and it has stuck ever since."

Outside of school, Mr. Taylor has coached swimming athletes for almost 10 years. He was a swimmer himself. He once raced Michael Phelps in 2008. "I raced against Phelps in the 200-meter Breaststroke, which was one of his worst races. Unsurprisingly, he still beat me by several seconds..."

Izzy Go, one of Mr. Taylor's students, said, "A memorable experience I have of Mr. Taylor is on picture day he dressed up as Where's Waldo. It was super funny." She also said, "Mr. Taylor is a great person and a great teacher, and even though I don't like math that much, he still manages to make me enjoy his class."

Another student in Mr. Taylor's class, Hazel, said "Mr. Taylor is fun, enjoyable, and entertaining. It is always a fun time in his class. He is a great teacher and includes everyone in numerous fun activities... he is very funny and silly."

"Solo" is also a meaningful song, but it represents being alone. It focuses on self-love or respect during breakup.
